Our trip to North Carolina went so well and I'm so glad we had the opportunity to go. When I first heard that we wouldn't be returning to Guatemala, I was really disappointed because I had been counting down the time until we could go since I first got back two years ago. Mrs. Hasbrouck really felt God's direction about where He could use us, and I'm so glad she listened and that we trusted her discernment. Otherwise I would have missed out on a wonderful experience. I witnessed talents and good characteristics shining through people I have known and been around for a while that I had not previously seen, such as creativity, obedience, and responsibility. And, I myself was able to practice diligence by doing what was asked or what needed to be done. A reoccurring appreciation that I had on this trip was that nothing became too overwhelming. There was always just enough comfort to keep me focused on the task in whatever challenge we faced. For example, the first day we went evangelizing door-to-door, I wanted to leave as fast as possible because the Spanish in my head seemed to disappear completely. I felt so inadequate and unprepared at first, but God showed me that I could leave the speaking part to the Spanish speaker with me and to instead listen to what he was saying and to follow along and look up the Bible verses he was referencing and to pray that God would open up their hearts. The next day I felt more at ease and relaxed because I knew it wasn't my words or my capability that mattered. Another way I noticed the good balance between comfort and challenge was on the first day that we went to the church. We had no idea what to expect, but I remembered that in Guatemala on the first day we were expected to launch right into everything we hadn't prepared yet. I was really dreading that initial meeting because it's hard to anticipate being "put on the spot", but when we got there we found that they just wanted to meet us. We had a day to get to know the church members, to observe their church service, and to plan with them what we were going to do the rest of the week.

A humbling experience I had on the trip was playing accompaniment on the piano. I'm used to memorizing piano solos, but I had never played while someone sang, and the two are very different. I don't like doing anything that I'm not good at, but it came down to willingness, because the church really wanted someone to play. Even though it was nerve-wracking and I felt embarrassed, I was able to practice with Mr. Hasbrouck and the guitarist and at the church, and from one night to the next it got easier and we all improved. I was really impressed with the church members' willingness to serve God. They wanted to cook us food, share the Gospel with their neighbors, expand their knowledge of parenting and leadership and improve in whatever ways they could. I think our biggest accomplishment was just encouraging the church. They are a wonderful group of people of all ages and different pasts, but they all work so well with each other as a result of their close relationship with God. My favorite way we spent our time was getting to know the church members, whether by playing sports, painting on the roof, teaching or eating – in whatever we did the fellowship was so rewarding. (Also, I really enjoyed being able to understand most of the Spanish, even though I mainly listened in Spanish and spoke in English.) It was a great trip with warm weather and awesome people.
